By serving as officers, committee members and spokespersons, members have opportunities to attend conferences, plan and conduct elections and meetings, and develop and manage a program of work.



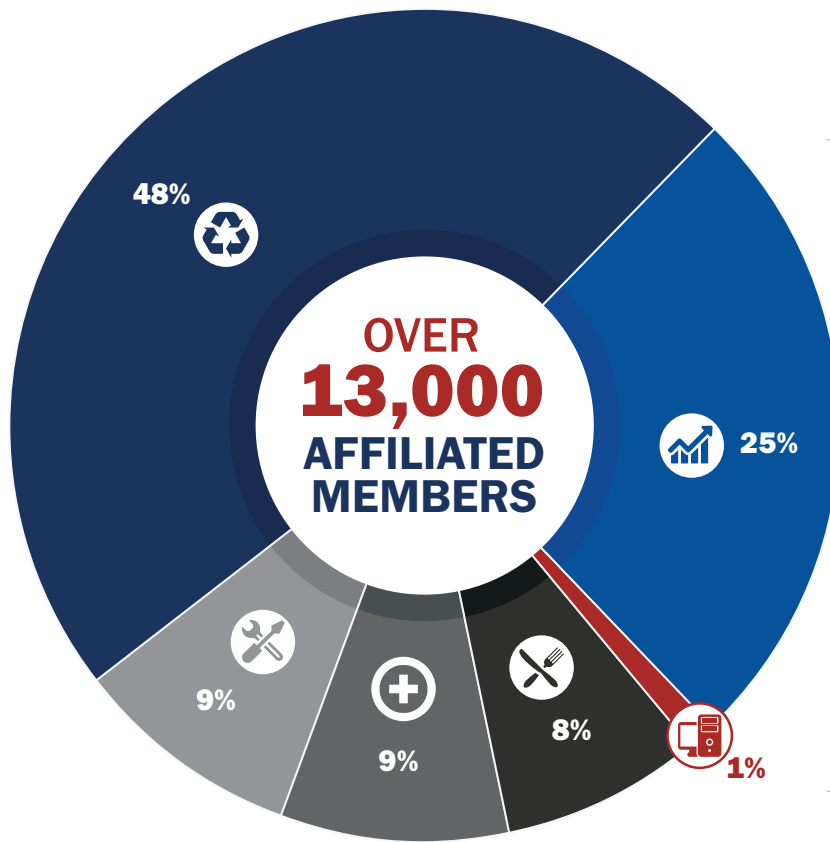
Networking opportunities

FCCLA:

- 52 secondary chapters.
- Three postsecondary chapters.
- One chapter earned **Exemplary Chapter** recognition.
- 19 members completed the **Power of One program**.
- Four members completed the **Stand Up community service project**.
- 20 advisers were **recognized for their years of service**.

SkillsUSA:

- 24 secondary chapters.
- Two postsecondary chapters.
- SkillsUSA received the **2021 Gold-Level State Standards of Excellence Award** for the second year. This indicates Idaho exceeded all accomplishments and standards.

BPA:

- 124 secondary chapters.
- Seven postsecondary chapters.
- 267 students qualified for nationals, 32 were top 10 finalists, one student placed first in the nation in their event.

FFA:

- 95 secondary chapters.
- Raised \$42,000 in scholarships, and \$17,000 in raffle scholarships.
- Earned 206 State Degrees and 33 American Degrees.

DECA:

- 16 secondary chapters.
- One postsecondary chapter.
- State teams participated in the first **Idaho DECA Marketing Challenge**. This gave students real-world experience creating a marketing plan for Next Steps Idaho.

HOSA:

- 58 secondary chapters.
- Two postsecondary chapters.
- Earned four outstanding state-wide awards.
- Earned 10 international awards.

TSA:

- 10 secondary chapters.
- 17 members qualified and competed in 13 different events.



Students who participate in CTSOs demonstrate higher levels of academic engagement and motivation, civic engagement, career self-efficacy and employability skills than other students.



According to the National Research Center for Career and Technical Education, participating in leadership and professional development activities in a CTSO raises students' educational aspirations.



Students who participate in school organizations in 10th grade have higher grade point averages and are more likely to be enrolled in college at 21 than other students.

PARTNER

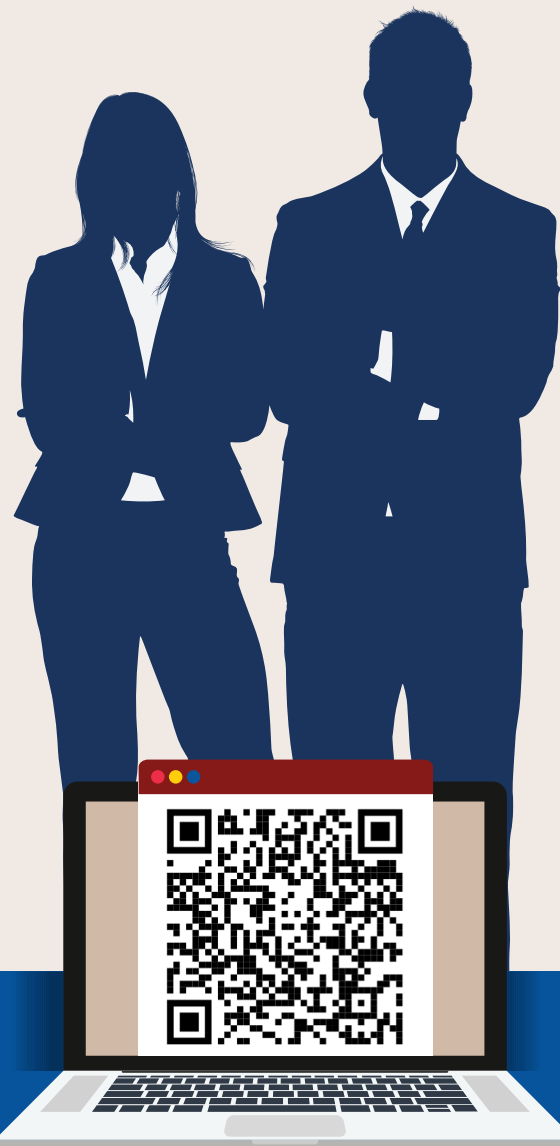
